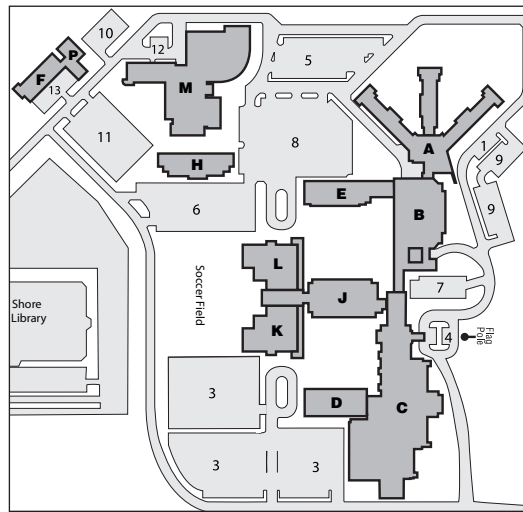

NEW CAMPUS PARKING POLICY TO TAKE EFFECT AUG. 17

In order to better serve Stritch students and guests in the spirit of Franciscan hospitality, the University has established a new parking policy that will take effect on Monday, Aug. 17.

The primary changes to the current parking situation include designated sections for employees and for students. Parking Lot 3, which is adjacent to Bonaventure Hall and the Sister Camille Kliebhan Conference Center, will be reserved for students and Stritch visitors only. Faculty and staff must park in Lots 5, 8 and 11 at the northern side of campus. Lot 6, between the Library and the new Assisi Hall, will be for student and visitor parking only.

In addition, Lot 4, just outside the east entrance to Bonaventure Hall, remains reserved for the president, chancellor and guests



of the president. Lot 7 remains faculty/staff parking only. Lots 1 and 9 outside Clare Hall remain reserved for residence hall students only.

Anyone who leaves a vehicle at Stritch overnight must continue to park only in Lot 8, including residents of Assisi Hall.

“After careful review of our parking situation, we feel that this policy is a proactive response to the needs of our students and guests, who are at the center of all that we do,” said Jack Glynn, vice president for facilities. “This clustered parking model should help alleviate congestion in the most popular lots at the most critical times, and reduce the number of tickets issued for illegal parking during peak hours.”

Daniel Sulmasy, OFM, M.D., Ph.D., is the inaugural Clinton-Kilbride Professor of Medicine and Medical Ethics at the University of Chicago, with joint appointments as professor in the School of Divinity and as associate director of the MacLean Center for Medical Ethics. Prior to these roles, he was chair of the John J. Conley Department of Ethics and held the Sisters of Charity Chair in Ethics at St. Vincent's Hospital in

Manhattan, in addition to serving as professor of medicine and director of the Bioethics Institute of the New York Medical College in Valhalla, NY.

He is the author of "The Healer's Calling" (1997), "The Rebirth of the Clinic" (2006), "A Balm for Gilead: Meditations on Spirituality and the Healing Arts" (2006), and is co-editor of "Methods in Medical Ethics" (2001). His numerous articles have appeared in medical, philosophical and theological journals and he has lectured widely in the U.S. and abroad.
