OFFICE RELOCATIONS TAKE PLACE TO ACCOMMODATE FACULTY

Stritch's Leadership Team has asked the Facilities staff to help provide hard-walled office space for faculty members who were without offices or were sharing cubicles since the beginning of the semester.



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STRITCH TO HOST “PORTRAITS OF MILWAUKEE LEADERSHIP” EXHIBIT RECEPTION AT CITY CENTER OCT. 23

Stritch will showcase past and present business and philanthropic leaders of Milwaukee during a retrospective exhibit of the renowned photography of B. Artin “Bob” Haig on Friday, Oct. 23, from 5-7 p.m. at the City Center. The reception will include brief remarks by Haig at 5:30 p.m.

Portraits to be displayed include Milwaukeeans such as William H. Davidson, son of one of the original founders of Harley-Davidson; Brooks Stevens, industrial designer; Jack Puelicher, chairman and president, Marshall & Ilsley Bank; Peg Bradley, wife of Harry Bradley of Allen Bradley Company; Francis E. Ferguson, CEO and chairman of Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company; and Erwin C. Uihlein, president of Schlitz Brewing Company.

B. Artin Haig was born in 1914 in Hadjin, a small village in Armenia. He left there as a young boy because of WWI and traveled through Europe and South America. After immigrating to the United States in 1924 through Ellis Island, he immediately wanted to become a citizen. After trying his hand at other careers, he followed his heart and became a photographer. He served an apprenticeship in theatrical photography in New York, and several years later became chief photographer at Underwood & Underwood in

Washington, D. C. During this period, some of the most illustrious names in history came before his camera, and he was appointed White House photographer.

In 1945, Haig moved to Texas, where his stature as a nationally recognized photographer was further enhanced by numerous awards. After coming to Wisconsin in early 1953, he founded the B. Artin Haig Studio, which quickly became a standard for the finest portraiture in the country. Many of the names synonymous with the growth of Wisconsin and the Midwest have been photographed by Haig.

In 1982, Haig sold his studios and continued to do consulting and freelance photography. Today, at the age of 95, longtime clients still request him for family portraits, though he no longer maintains his own studio. A recognized authority in bridal portraiture, Haig has lectured widely to photographers on the techniques of portrait photography. His rich experience and incredible artistic ability have helped create hundreds of formal portraits like the ones on display in this collection, which showcase his dedication to craftsmanship.

OFFICE OF MULTICULTURAL RELATIONS TO DISH CUSTARD AND STIR-FRYS IN SUPPORT OF CIVIL RIGHTS PILGRIMAGE

Stritch's Office of Multicultural Relations invites faculty, staff and students to two upcoming events designed to raise funds for the second annual Civil Rights Pilgrimage, which is scheduled to take place Jan. 4-13, 2010.

The first event will take place on Monday, Oct. 26 from 5-8 p.m. at Culver's, 1325 E. Capitol Drive in Shorewood. 10% of the total proceeds from menu items sold during this time period will be donated to the pilgrimage. Free shuttle rides from Clare Hall will be available for students. The custard flavor of the day will be "Stritch Mint." Stritch mascot Wolfie will be present to greet patrons. Faculty and staff are encouraged to stop by Culver's to pick up dinner for their families on the way home.

The second fundraiser features Stritch employees grilling stir-frys on Monday, Nov. 16 at Bd's Mongolian Grill in Bayshore Town Center. Darrell Lofton, coordinator of multicultural relations, and Rich Panella, women's basketball coach, will be on the grill from 11:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m. During the dinner shift from 5:30-7:30 p.m., Lofton, Chris Smith, enrollment services counselor, and Joseph Niswonger, director of residence life, will be on the grill. Tickets for lunch or dinner at Bd's are available for \$25, which includes stir fry, soup, salad and a beverage. To purchase tickets, contact Lofton at ext. 4196 or dlofton@stritch.edu.

The pilgrimage is intended to explore the history of the civil rights movement in Atlanta, Memphis, and three cities in Alabama: Montgomery, Birmingham and Selma. Participants will visit landmarks, attend lectures, interact with students from predominantly black colleges, and engage in reflection activities to process the journey.

Students will participate in a number of service opportunities while on the trip, such as volunteering in a daycare or interviewing Jim Crow era activists for a new interactive installment in the National Voting Rights Museum. In addition, a blog will be maintained from the road so that people can follow the trip as it's happening.

The total cost for the trip is \$750 per person for the 10-day experience. In order to make the trip affordable, students are only being charged \$400 of that cost, which means the rest needs to be raised. You can help by making a donation, purchasing concessions at campus sporting events, or supporting the pilgrimage through the fundraisers noted above.
